For servicemembers, veterans, and their families, participation in the arts - whether for expressive, educational, recreational, or therapeutic purposes - is proven to build resilience, enhance coping skills, increase self-esteem, and generate well-being. The arts also promote community reintegration and raise awareness about the experiences and struggles of these populations.

This proposed 6-week, countywide initiative will run from late October through November 2018 and will consist of three components:

- Exhibitions, performances and other special events at select venues throughout the county;
- Free workshops in a variety of arts disciplines for veterans, active military and their families designed for relaxation, enjoyment, reflection, inspiration and morale building; and
- Middle and high school field trip program that includes teacher professional development in both history and art.


Cornerstone exhibition with featured artists:

He shares with us his many-layered mental, emotional and physical experiences as well as the processes of excavation that inform them. The title of this initiative is taken from the title of his body of work and accompanying writings.
- **Dennis Smith**, Vietnam veteran responsible for creating the sculptures at the Living Memorial Sculpture Garden in Weed.




Why? Dennis Smith
